TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Isaiah tells us something that we already know, and yet seem to forget every now and then. He tells us, essentially, that God is God and we are not. When we're confused and troubled and can't figure everything out, it might be wise to recall Isaiah speaking on the Lord's behalf and explaining that God—who is on a much more, well, Godly wavelength than we are—moves in ways we can't even imagine.

Saint Paul, by comparison, has everything figured out. Kind of. At least he understands his calling in life—to magnify Christ in everything he does. That should give all of us the direction we need. Jesus gives us direction, too, explaining to us once again in the parable of the workers in the vineyard that the last will be first, and the first, last.

Thanks to Father Mike for speaking about the changes in the liturgy. Actually, the changes often bring us back to something we once knew. If you are my age or older, for example, we recognize the Confiteor in the new translation as being pretty much the one we learned as children. I thought Father Mike's comment that some of these prayers are 1500 years old was very helpful. It means the prayers we hear today were heard by Saint Anselm, Saint Francis, Christopher Columbus and millions of people throughout the centuries. I think the image of the unity we have with these people who have gone before us is a neat image. Remember the web sites Father Mike encouraged us to look at.

PREPARING FOR THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS

Why a New Translation?

On the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011, Catholic parishes in the United States will begin praying the texts of the Mass using a new English translation of the Roman Missal. Many have wondered why the Church is implementing a new translation of the prayers of the Mass at this time. When you really think about it, it makes all the sense in the world that the Church is implementing a new translation that is more faithful to the original Latin because the Mass is the very core of Catholic life. The prayers of the Mass express our Catholic beliefs and the more clearly we can express those beliefs, the more our faith can grow and be nourished. Many Church leaders, most prominently the late Blessed Pope John Paul II, felt that many of the current translations of the Latin were done hastily after the Second Vatican Council in the early 1960s, when the Church throughout the world began praying the Mass in the languages of the people rather than in Latin. The new translation that we will be using has taken nearly a decade to produce and, as Pope John Paul II desired, is closer to the original Latin. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co

NOTES FROM THE PRINCIPAL....

If your child attends a Catholic School, you may be aware that he or she will not have school this Friday, September 23rd. This week is Catechetical Sunday—a good time to reflect on what we are doing about developing a deeper foundation of faith.

FEAST OF FAITH

Doxology and Amen

“Doxology” comes from a Greek word meaning “words of praise.” The Eucharistic Prayer ends with a doxology addressed to the triune God: “Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.” It is an exclamation of praise, honor, and glory to God, reminding us that we receive everything from God through the Son, in the power of the Spirit. At the consecration, the priest held up the host and then the chalice for us to see and adore. During the doxology, the host and chalice are held up again, but this time they are held up and offered to God the Father. With the doxology, the Eucharistic Prayer ends, as it began, with words of praise addressed to the Father: truly, it is right and just to give God praise, and we assent to this in our whole-hearted acclamation, “Amen.” Never was more meaning packed into so short a word. This “Amen,” sometimes and fittingly called “the great Amen,” is our response to the entire Eucharistic Prayer.

GOD'S ECONOMY

Today we hear about a landowner who hired laborers to work in his vineyard. The first hires agreed on a day's pay. When work ended the men were paid, the first hires receiving the same as the late hires. Imagine the grumbling! Fairness and justice in the marketplace are essential. In 1891, Pope Leo XIII issued *Rerum Novarum* (“Of New Things”). This ground-breaking document discussed the relationships and duties of labor and capital, governments and citizens. It called for just wages for people to support families, and the right of labor to unionize. The pope rejected both communism and unrestricted capitalism, and affirmed the right to private property. In the Gospel, Jesus is not addressing these issues, but God's relationship with people. God acts with justice: like the laborers who worked all day, we receive what God promised. God also gives beyond simple justice, giving unexpectedly and lavishly. In God's economy we all get what we deserve and more than we ever bargained for.
