TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

What wonderful images we have today of the reign of God! Isaiah speaks to us of a great feast—a heavenly feast—a feast of abundance with rich foods and choice wines. It is the Lord's own affair, Isaiah explains, when God will unite all nations, dry every tear, and destroy death forever. Then, too, will the entire earth rejoice in the Lord and bask in God's saving grace.

Jesus speaks of heaven in terms of a feast as well. Here, the kingdom of heaven is likened to a king's wedding feast given for his son. This is a feast of abundance also, with the fattened cattle prepared just so. But many of the people invited don't want to come, so the king invites anyone who would honor his son by their presence there. And Paul tells us that whether we live abundantly or in humble circumstances, we can do all things in the Lord who strengthens us.

NOTES FROM FATHER TOM.....

Last weekend before the 4:30 Mass we had a little music practice for the new liturgy. We need to get familiar with the new Gloria and Mass Parts (Holy, Holy, Memorial acclamation) which are different in the new liturgy. Hymns stay the same. The Gloria is especially problematic since we do not do a Gloria in Advent and the new liturgy starts on the First Sunday of Advent. That means if we do not practice the Gloria, it would debut on Christmas Eve. It certainly would not sound festive with everyone trying to figure it out. Saturday's practice did not work because the words on the card and what was being sung were different. So we have printed cards and inserted them in the Breaking Bread books so that we can get this right. Now we will do the new Gloria at all the Masses until Advent starts so that we have it right by Christmas.

PREPARING FOR THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

On the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011, Catholic parishes in the United States will begin praying the texts of the Mass using a new English translation of the Roman Missal. This week, we explore what the Liturgy of the Eucharist is about.

We begin by preparing the altar for the holy sacrifice to come. In the Prayer Over the Gifts we get ready to offer ourselves and our lives together with the bread and wine that we, too, might be transformed by God. In the Preface Dialog we declare that it is right and just to give thanks to the Lord our God, and in the Preface we proclaim the reasons that we have to give our thanks and praise. Then comes the great Eucharistic Prayer by which we render our thanks and praise to God the Father. As we recall what Jesus said and we do what he did at the Last Supper, God transforms the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ, and we pray that we will

a l s o b e transformed by the Eucharist we celebrate and receive. We ratify this wonderful action with the Great Amen, and prepare for the culmination of the Liturgy of the Eucharist in Holy Communion.

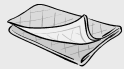
It would make a difference!

FEAST OF FAITH Agnus Dei

After the sign of peace, the priest breaks the host into pieces, and prepares the patens or plates of hosts for the assembly. In the early church, "the breaking of the bread" was the name given to the entire Eucharistic liturgy, so central was this action to the meaning of the Christian life. For just as the one bread is broken and given to many people, the many are made one in receiving it.

During this ritual action, we sing an ancient litany, calling on Jesus as the "Lamb of God"—the words used by John the Baptist when he pointed to Jesus walking beside the Jordan River (John 1:29, 36). In calling Jesus "the Lamb of God," John was already pointing to the death that Jesus would die: in giving his life, Jesus would become the Paschal Lamb of the new covenant. During the Mass, when we call on the Lamb of God, we call to mind his self-sacrificing love, his blood poured out for us, and we ask this compassionate Lord for mercy and peace.

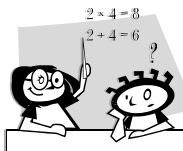
